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Spencer: Yeovil can book a trip to Anfield

THE man who scored the first goal in Yeovil's history at Huish Park will head back to the ground today hoping - and half expecting - to see Yeovil Town get the better of Liverpool. The goal that would take them back to Anfield for a replay.

Micky Spencer actually scored twice in the game in 1989, but it was the current one that was the first at the club since 1980.

"I arrived at the ground that day very excited, but I was disappointed when I saw me out and I arrived with my best foot," he recalls.

One of Spencer's matches was a 2-0 draw against Arsenal, and although he did not score, he remembers some early half chances for the Gunners that went begging.

"If the lads can get an early breakthrough, I think Liverpool will be beaten. I think we've got a chance," he said.

"They will come here not to play football, but to win. I've never seen them in like that but I don't think they would be prepared to do a 100-yard sprint on the centre," he said.
