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and scream for me. I've got a

couple of Rottweilers there. "It was important to do that and they can't hear you out there anyway because both sets of supporters were giving it a go. I trust them so much, I just let them get on with it.

"This is for the whole club, the directors, our families and the players, the supporters and everyone who works at the club who has done a fantastic job over the last ten years.

"They are unsung heroes and I am very pleased for them because they have stuck to it and they all entered into this commitment and this ambition to get to the Championship and they believed it.

The 57-year-old is out of contract in the summer and said he would now enter negotiations over extending his stay. 'We'll be sitting down to

talk," he confirmed, before joking: "They've got £4million now and that will be my salary,

I don't know about the rest." Brentford boss Uwe Rosler believed his side deserved an equaliser in the second half, but admitted nerves got the better of some of his squad.

Rosler's men, who will now spend a fifth season in the third tier after failing to win a game in normal time since April 13, were slow out of the traps and went a goal down inside six minutes.

And despite their secondhalf fightback, which saw them half the deficit through Dean before being denied by a string of fine saves by Yeovil goalkeeper Marek Stech, they failed to make the break-through, leaving Rosler to question whether the occasion got the better of his Bees.

"Some players were over-whelmed, especially at the be-

ginning of the game," he said. 'Our game didn't function as it should then the goal killed it even more in terms of confidence. I couldn't really see nerves in terms of the dressing room and the build up, I couldn't sense anything.

"But in the first half we were a bit nervous and one or two players just reacted and didn't act as much. That isn't a criticism, but some of those players had never played in a stadium like that before.

"Every time we play Yeovil they don't need to work hard to get the first goal and when you go 1-0 down against Yeovil, who defend very deep in their own half, then you'll make life difficult.

"Our players had nothing to lose and lost their nerves. We then bombarded them in the second half and we really should have got an equaliser out of it.
