GARY Johnson has hailed the efforts of the "lieutenants" in his management team as well as brother and scout Pete after capping a history-making campaign with a top accolade.


A little over 24 hours after

beating Brentford 2-1 at Wembley to win the npower League One play-offs, Johnson was named the division's boss of the season by the League Man-agers' Association.

The 57-year-old, erry Skiverton assistant Terry Skiverton technical coach Darren Way and head scout Pete rubbed shoulders with the likes of Sir Alex Fer-guson and his Manchester United successor David Moyes at the London dinner before rejoining his squad for Tuesday's bus tour of Yeovil.

Johnson spoke of his pride at winning the LMA award but praised the chemistry between his coaches as well as the work carried out by his brother.

"I'm very proud to receive the manager of the year award



for our division and I'm sure that I must have got at least one vote from the Oldham manager (son Lee)," said Johnson.

"But like all awards accept the award on behalf of your staff, especially Terry Skiverton, Darren Way and (keeper coach) Gareth Stew-

art.
"You also accept them on who works behalf of everyone who works for the football club from the top to the bottom, whose work might go unnoticed but who have still been key parts of the success of the past ten years.

"I had Terry, Darren and also my brother Pete with me. He's also a little bit of an unsung hero and works very hard without people necessarily see-ing it all ing it all.

'He's at games every night and he's very important in our recruitment of quality players at good value. He deserved his Wembley trip and place on the bus tour.

"I feel the chemistry between us has helped get this club into the Championship.

The Glovers were cheered by thousands on their return to the town on Tuesday, with supporters lining the streets from Huish Park to the Borough and then packing the Westland Leisure Complex car park ahead of the evening's civic reception.

Players and staff also enjoyed a tour of AgustaWestland in the afternoon, where employees came out in their hundreds to applaud their new

Johnson said the celebra-tions were a fitting way to end a season where his team defied the odds to reach the Cham-pionship for the first time, adding he was leaking forward. adding he was looking forward to finally reflecting on Sunday's game.

"It's lovely to end the season celebrating with the fans. I think the boys have been celebrating with the fans for a couple of days," he said.

"We were still in London for the League Managers' Associ-ation dinner but as soon as we got back we realised the euphoria around the town.

"It was really well organised and we felt we had got around to everyone we needed to. I'm sure most people will feel it was worth turning out to acclaim their new heroes.

"I'm looking forward to a quiet day when I can put my feet up and look back at the game and at the celebrations at the end again.

Skipper admits struggling to believe club's achievements

JAMIE McAllister admitted lifting a trophy at Wembley to reach the npower Champion-ship with a club that ten years ago was in the non-League was hard to believe.

The Yeovil Town captain led his team up the famous steps to the Royal Box at the national stadium on Sunday, having beaten Brentford 2-1. The Glovers begin their summer break this week but will return at the end of next month to prepare to face the likes of QPR, Wigan Athletic and Blackburn Rovers.

Left back McAllister - who

arrived at Huish Park last summer - described their moment of glory in the capital as an "unbelievable" end to an "incredible" season.

"It's an incredible feeling and we had been dreaming about it all week," he said. "We had the belief but to actually do it was amazing. At the end of the game I turned around to my wife, family and kids and the emotion was all there.

"I just thought 'what an achievement, what an achievement for such a small club'. But we had the belief in the dressing room as well as the quality

all season to be able to get up there so to actually do it is unbelievable.

"It's unbelievable to think that a club that wasn't even in the Football League ten years ago is now in the second tier and next season will be playing teams like QPR. It's an incredible achievement. The gaffer (Gary Johnson), (assistant) Terry (Skiverton) and (technical coach) Darren (Way) have been incredible and the players - every one of them - have been outstanding. The fans turned out for them and backed us.

"All throughout your career

you want to be a captain lifting a trophy at Wembley or Hamp-den Park but to do it is incredible and unbelievable.'

McAllister, who next week sits his UEFA coaching A-Licence, dedicated victory to the supporters that he believes will also make opposition teams wary of heading to a Huish Park ground that boasts a capacity of barely 9,000.

The 35-year-old said: "We could hear the fans throughout and we wanted to do it for them. I don't think a few teams will want to come to Huish Park next season."
