YEOVIL WON THE STYLES BATTLE

Direct Methods Brought Goals That Celtic's Craft Failed To Do

HOW HOME RECORD WAS RETAINED-F.D.V.

RISING to the occasion in the Cup-tie manner, Yeovil Town retained their season's unbeaten home record when they defeated the famous Scottish League side, Celtic, by 2 goals to none at Huish last evening.

From the start of this interesting game it was evident that Yeovil were going to put up a fight. After ten minutes Bobbie Hamilton picked up a loose ball from a Foulds corner kick and it flashed into the top of the net, leaving Bonnar no chance.

Playing clever football, one expected Celtic to get the equaliser, but Dyke was there when McPhail sent in a terrific shot from five yards out, and just afterwards Dyke saved another from Taylor. Things looked very shaky when Peacock broke through, but he shot against an upright with the goal at his mercy.

With this expected onslaught over, it was Yeovil's forwards who looked dangerous. Once Phillips cleverly backheeled for Mansley to send just wide of the post.

Celtic exerted pressure but they were met by resolute tackling by Yeovil's defence. Ten minutes before the end, Foulds again sent in a perfect corner kick—and Mansley scored with an overhead kick.

Yeovil deserved their victory, for while lacking the arts of close football, shown by the Scottish cracks, the home side's more direct methods brought the goals.

Neither side made changes
Yeovil forced Colchester backs
on their heels with penetrating
attacks a few minutes after the
kick-off. Centre-ford Phillips

The home side attacked constantly and only desperate
clearances by Wright, the visitors'

Kettle kept their goal intact.

Foulds, who, lying almost on the
ground, sent the ball into the net
with his head but was given offside.

accurate passes but the home
team's attacks were of such force
an dsuddenness that a slip on
their opponents' part would
surely have brought a goal,

scoring only to be thwarted in
