

For one Merthyr player revenge was sweet. Greg Downs, the former Norwich City player, was Hereford's player-boss when Yeovil beat them in the Cup four years ago. He has been languishing with little Malvern but was brought back by Merthyr's manager Colin Addison to add experience to his team.

Addison's side now head for Leyton Orient in the first round proper. Yeovil head for some big away league games needing to prove to Roberts and the fans that they don't bottle out on the big occasion.
