On playing matters, Mr Fry said he knew nothing about the possibility of Yeovil signing Dorchester goalgetter Owen Pickard. According to some reports the ex-Plymouth and Hereford striker is being chased by Yeovil and Cheltenham.

Pickard told me this week that he had virtually agreed personal terms with Cheltenham, who had offered Dorchester £10,000 for the player who is now out of contract. The Magpies say that it not enough. "I believe they want £15,000", said Pickard.

Has he been approached by Yeovil?

"No", he said. "My manager (Stuart Morgan) told me he had had a call from Yeovil but that is all I know. Obviously if Yeovil came in I would be interested. They are a big club with big support"

Commented Mr Fry: "There can be nothing more specific until our manager Graham Roberts comes back from holiday next week. He may know something that I don"t"
