

aving started the season with a short tour of Cornwall under the new manager Russell Slade, Yeovil enjoyed the visit of local rivals Exeter and Premiership Portsmouth, before kicking off the season at The New Den the home of newly demoted Millwall.

Having started well, Yeovil led through a Wayne Gray goal but couldn't hold on for the 90 minutes and had to be satisfied with a 1-1 draw following a Darren Byfield goal.

Supporters left feeling good, but the optimism soon evaporated after they struggled in their first home match against AFC Bournemouth in a boring, uneventful 0-0 draw.

Things improved for the return of Kevin Gall's new club Carlisle as the home side ran out 2-1 winners, but needless to say the Welshman had the last laugh, scoring the visitors' goal after Chris Cohen and substitute Ishmael Welsh had put Yeovil in control.


Next up for Yeovil was an away trip to Merseyside to face Tranmere and after Chris Cohen had equalised an early Ellison goal, things were looking good, but The Glovers couldn't hold on and Mullin secured all the points for Tranmere.





























SEPTEMBER 2006














JANUARY 2007




Brentford were the next visitors to Huish Park, but despite a gritty defensive showing, they couldn't keep Leon Best out and that won the game for Yeovil.










But the return to Huish Park saw another slump as Tranmere won by 2-0 to undo all the good work at Brunton Park.



















MARCH 2007

But the pitch was the only real winner as Vale slotted home two more goals to run out easy winners.



Blackpool were the next visitors at Huish Park and despite another attacking display, the Northerners nicked all the points with a 1-0 victory.




Another away defeat ended the month when fellow Play-off hopefuls Oldham secured all the points with a 1-0 victory at Boundary Park.


So all to play for with Yeovil going into the penultimate month of the season in 5th.place.


















APRIL 2007






Another single goal victory saw off Doncaster the following week and at last the supporters had a Play-off match against either Oldham or Blackpool to look forward to.



If you weren't there you missed a fantastic night that those present will never ever forget.


So it was all systems go for a Wembley final against Blackpool and nearly 30,000 Yeovil fans made the trip to see their heroes perform.

But sadly on the day the team just couldn't raise their game one more time and the dream of Championship football was dashed.


The Seasiders ran out 2-0 winners and it was a very sombre coach trip home from Wembley.

Some will savour the day, but Wembley is not a place for losers and Russell and the team will be doing everything they can to repeat the adventure next season.















































































The Glovers

Profiles of the players that took Yeovil Town Football Club to it's highest ever position in the Football League

Steve Mildenhall

Squad number: 1 Position: Goalkeeper League appearances: 46

ildenhall followed Russell Slade south from Grimsby in the summer of 2006 and proved an inspired signing.

The only squad member to play every minute of every game, the 29-year-old rightly ended the season rated as one of the best goalkeepers in League One.

Tall, commanding and an excellent shot-stopper, there appear to be few weaknesses in the Swindon-born shot-stopper's game.

Started his career at Swindon Town and had spells with Notts County and Oldham Athletic before moving to Grimsby.

After losing at the Millennium Stadium with the Mariners, Mildenhall suffered play-off final disappointment for the second season running at Wembley with Yeovil.

Will want to make it third time lucky next year and is undoubtedly capable of playing at a higher level.





Andy Lindegaard

Squad number: 16
Position: Full-back
League appearances: 14

he departure of Kevin Amankwaah to Swansea before the start of the season saw Lindegaard become Yeovil's first choice right-back and he started the campaign well.

But just four games in, the Yeovil-born defender suffered a groin injury at Tranmere which eventually needed surgery.

In Lindegaard's absence, manager Russell Slade signed Mark Lynch on a permanent basis from Hull City and the former Manchester United player slotted into the right-back role with ease.

After several setbacks, Lindegaard returned to fitness over Christmas and his comeback coincided with Lynch suffering a serious knee injury.

Martin Cranie initially took over at right-back, but when he was recalled by Southampton, Lindegaard got another chance.

He played six times and looked to be establishing himself again before sustaining another injury, this time at Carlisle.

The former Town trainee played a key role in the play-offs, starting all three games and notably setting up Marcus Stewart's memorable equaliser at Nottingham Forest.

Mark Lynch

Squad number: 24
Position: Right-back
League appearances: 17

ynch joined the Glovers on loan from Hull City in August following the injury to Andy Lindegaard but endured a tough debut as Town were hammered 5-2 at Southampton in the Carling Cup first round.

But he quickly showed the quality expected from a former Manchester United youngster and his raids down the right flank became a feature of Yeovil's early season success.


Boss Russell Slade made the move permanent before the transfer window closed on September 1, with Lynch switching to Huish Park on a free transfer.


The 25-year-old had been unlucky with injuries at his previous clubs, Sunderland and Hull, and he suffered again in December when he sustained a serious knee injury in training.

Lynch quickly underwent surgery and spent five months in rehabilitation before returning to fitness for the final league game of the season.

An impressive performance at Gillingham secured the Mancunian a place on the bench for the play-offs and he made it on to the field at Wembley as a replacement for Andy Lindegaard.

The subsequent departure of Lindegaard shows that Slade now regards Lynch as his first choice in the right-back position for the 07-08 season.





Nathan Jones

Squad number: 3
Position: Left-back
League appearances: 42

ones was another of Yeovil's star performers in an impressive campaign and will have enjoyed his second season at Huish Park much more than his first.

Undisputed first choice at left-back all season, the Welshman only missed league games through suspension or injury.

Jones belies his 34 years and is one of the fittest players in the Town squad.

The former Brighton defender was also installed as Yeovil's vice-captain during the season, deputising for regular skipper Terry Skiverton and having the honour of leading the team out at the new Wembley Stadium.

Forced to undergo groin surgery in March, Jones astonished everyone by making his comeback within two weeks and only missing two games.

He also enjoyed a fairytale return in his first game back from the operation when he hammered home a 90th minute winner against Chesterfield.

A committed Christian and one of the real characters in the squad, Jones was rewarded for his good form with a new two-year contract.

Terrell Forbes

Squad number: 6
Position: Defender

League appearances: 46

orbes was another player tempted south by Russell Slade, ending an unhappy spell at Oldham Athletic to move to Huish Park.

Had previously played under Slade at Grimsby Town, where he was used at right-back, centre half and as a sweeper.

Quickly established himself in central defence at Yeovil, forming a solid partnership with captain Terry Skiverton.

Forbes'pace and reading of the game makes him an ideal covering defender and one of the best man markers in the Football League.

He specialises in goal-saving tackles and was one of the real success stories of Yeovil's season.

Slade utilised his versatility when Mark Lynch and Andy Lindegaard were injured, switching Forbes to right-back and allowing him to attack down the right flank.

But Forbes undoubtedly prefers playing as a central defender and he was Yeovil's best player in the disappointing play-off final at Wembley.





Terry Skiverton Squad number: 4

Squad number: 4 Position: Defender

League appearances: 39

he Yeovil captain enjoyed another impressive season for the Glovers but was forced to miss the play-offs through injury.

In his eighth season at Huish Park, Skiverton again led by example and remains a talismanic figure.

His goal output was down on previous seasons, with the 32-year-old only netting twice.

But his partnership with Terrell Forbes at the heart of Yeovil's defence was one of the best in League One and one of the reasons that only champions Scunthorpe conceded fewer goals than the Glovers.

Town fans feared the worst when Skiverton collapsed with exhaustion at Blackpool in October, but he recovered to score the winner in Yeovil's next game against Oldham.

Injured in both league games with Bristol City, Skiverton also limped out of the win over Crewe in December.

And a late season groin injury robbed him of the chance to play at Wembley, although he did recover sufficiently to take his place on the bench.

Scott Guyett

Squad number: 5
Position: Defender

League appearances: 16

of the season when he replaced injured captain Terry Skiverton and played a key role in Yeovil reaching the play-off final at Wembley.

Skiverton's impressive performances meant Guyett didn't start a league game until January.

But Guyett was robbed of the chance of a run in the side before that, when he was sent off in the home game against Bristol City for retaliating against Louis Carey.

With Skiverton sidelined Guyett was in line to deputise, but a three-match ban put paid to that. It was a case of déjà vu when Yeovil visited Ashton Gate as Skiverton was again injured and Guyett came on to replace him, only to be red carded a second time.

Thankfully referee Mike Dean later rescinded that decision, allowing Guyett to play his part at the end of the season.

Surprisingly failed to score throughout the season, but his aerial power makes the Aussie a threat at set-pieces.





Paul Terry

Squad number: 7
Position: Midfielder
League appearances: 20

erry eventually signed a new contract over protracted negotiations in the summer of 2006 and became a key man over the first half of the season.

Boss Russell Slade used a variety of midfield systems over the early months, but all of them featured Terry in the holding role as he was told to screen the Glovers' defence.

The Londoner did manage to get forward to score two goals, netting the winner against Port Vale, but was always aware of his defensive duties.

Terry's discipline allowed Chris Cohen to have a greater degree of freedom and was instrumental in the youngster's goalscoring run at the start of the season.

Unfortunately Terry suffered a serious knee injury at Rotherham in early December which curtailed his campaign and required major surgery.

But after undergoing treatment and rehabilitation at Premiership club Chelsea, where his brother John is club captain, Terry made a quicker than anticipated recovery and even came close to a place on the bench in the Play-off final. Will be fully fit for the start of the 07-08 season.

Anthony Barry

Squad number: 8
Position: Midfielder
League appearances: 24

arry returned to action at the start of the 06-07 season after a terrible injury ended his previous campaign prematurely.

But after starting the first two games, the Scouser then dropped out of the team as his lack of match action probably caught up with him.


Barry sat out most of September and October, but made a dramatic return to the starting line-up in November when he was part of the team that impressively defeated Bristol City at Huish Park.

The former Accrington midfielder enjoyed another short run in the side but was again relegated to the bench in December.

Thereafter the playmaker was restricted to occasional appearances before a late season revival.

He again came back into the side against Bristol City in April and then kept his place for the rest of the campaign as he played particularly well in the Play-off semi-finals against Nottingham Forest.

Building Supplies

Jean-Paul Kalala

Squad number: 14 Position: Midfielder League appearances: 38

alala was the third former Grimsby player to link up with Slade, following Mildenhall and Forbes to Huish Park.

The DR Congo international hit the national headlines during his time at Blundell Park when his spectacular long-range strike knocked Tottenham Hotspur out of the Carling Cup.

Started the season on the bench at Huish Park but quickly established himself in the side in a defensive midfield role.

Kalala became even more important to the set-up when Paul Terry sustained a season-ending injury and formed an impressive partnership with Chris Cohen over the second half of the campaign.

The former Nice player was affected by a virus in April which saw him substituted against Bristol City and then left on the bench against Rotherham.

Kalala's place in the side was taken by Anthony Barry, although he did score his only goal of the season when selected in the shadow squad that faced Gillingham.

And the Congolese player also made an impact when he replaced the injured Cohen in the second leg of the Play-off semifinal at Nottingham Forest, slamming a long-range shot against a post and seeing the rebound deflected in by Alan Wright.

Chris Cohen

Squad number: 11 Position: Midfielder League appearances: 44

aving been voted player of the year in 05-06 while on loan, Cohen made a permanent move from West Ham during the summer break for an undisclosed fee.

He quickly proved his importance to the side during a superb start to the season, with his all-action style again endearing him to the fans.

Initially selected on the left of a 'diamond' midfield, Cohen was then handed a free role behind a lone striker as boss Russell Slade tried to give his star man more freedom.

The move worked as Cohen got forward to great effect, both scoring and creating goals for his side. The teenager linked particularly well with Lee Morris and Marcus Stewart and at times their linked play belonged at a far higher level than League One.

In December the arrival of Leon Best prompted Slade to return to a 4-4-2 system, with Cohen moving back to an orthodox midfield role and being forced to curb his attacking instincts.

He still turned in outstanding performances and it was no surprise to see him linked with a move away from Huish Park in January.

Fortunately no transfer was forthcoming and Cohen stayed to spearhead the Glovers' play-off push.

Cohen battled through a series of injuries in the closing weeks and a groin injury forced him out of both the Play-off semi-final second leg and the final at Wembley and resulted in a summer operation.





Arron Davies

Squad number: 9 Position: Winger

League appearances: 39

avies was another player who was handed a variety of roles throughout the season as he lined up in midfield, out wide and up

He started the campaign in the 'hole', playing just behind the front two in the draw at Millwall.

But when that formation was abandoned, the Welshman found himself on the bench before being recalled in a wide role.

He scored his first goal of the season from that position in the 3-2 win at Huddersfield and was a regular in the side throughout October.

Martin Brittain's arrival saw Davies left out of the home game with Bristol City at the start of November, but he responded in the right way as he scored the opening goal after coming off the bench.

With Stewart unavailable, he was recalled at home to Bristol City and netted in a memorable 2-1 victory.


But when Stewart returned to Ashton Gate in December, Leon Best came in to play up front and Gray was again among the substitutes.

However, Maher only made the bench once more before moving back to Ireland on loan.


Striker Knights initially arrived from Ipswich on trial but impressive performances in the reserves saw him recruited on loan in March for the rest of the season.

Canadian winger McCallum completed a trio of debutants against the Gills, replacing Martin Brittain.


